Oliver found new solutions every time we were stuck with ideas of how to solve a "problem".

He was the one that showed me how to make a doug-out canoe. No-one in Norway new how to and if he hadn't arrived I would have built it a totally wrong way. He showed up at the exactly right time. His participation made it possible to make the doug-out in the old way, traditional way, which made the Norwegian scientists interested in such a way that I made a film for Norwegian television about the history of doug-out canoes in Norway. The film actually changed the scientists attitude of the importance of doug-outs in Norwegian history! They changed the history books!

Later on we had someone make another doug-out for the camp (Tuva's husband) but it wasn't nearly as nice as the one Oliver helped us build. He said he had built two of them when he was a kid.

Oliver was the one who suggested we should make a huge wigwam for more than 100 people. It was perfect for our use. We had planned to build a big lavvo (same-tent) but didn't have a space for a tent like that and was aware that all the heat from a stove would disappear in a tall construction like that. A wigwan, made of bent poles was perfect for us: Nice looking, original and functional with its low roof. Oliver designed the whole thing. He helped us find stiff spruce poles for the framing and soft trees for the poles who we should bend. He then designed a huge steamer (18 feet long) out of a oil barrel and some ventilation tubes. It made it possible to bend the poles. It all worked just perfect! It became the, by far, most important building in the camp. No one would doubt that Oliver ment everything he said and that his opinions was built on a lot of experience.
